FDOT to Host Public Meetings Jan. 23 and 25 for Proposed Seawall Replacement Project from the Bridge of Lions to Charlotte Street

ST. JOHNS COUNTY, Fla. – The Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) will host two public meetings to discuss the proposed Seawall Replacement project from the Bridge of Lions to Charlotte Street in St. Johns County. This project aims to replace the seawall while enhancing storm protection and maintaining the aesthetics of the area. The proposed improvements include lowering the existing promenade and constructing a new 42-inch solid pedestrian barrier.

A virtual meeting will be held Tuesday, Jan. 23 with an online open house from 5:30 to 6 p.m., followed by a presentation and public comment period at 6 p.m. To attend the virtual meeting, visit www.nflroads.com/VPH to register or join by phone in listen-only mode by calling (877) 309-2071 and entering access code 304-978-247.

An in-person public meeting will be held Thursday, Jan. 25 at the St. Augustine City Hall, Alcazar Room, 75 King Street. With an open house from 4 to 6 p.m. and presentation and public comment period beginning at 6 p.m.

The meetings serve to inform the public of the proposed improvements and provide an opportunity for the public to express opinions and concerns regarding the project.
