

I-95 at Zoo Parkway Ramp and Lane Closures Scheduled Overnight August 29 through September 2

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. – Ramps and lanes at the I-95, Zoo Parkway (State Road 105/Heckscher Drive) and Broward Road interchange are scheduled to close overnight Sunday, August 29 through Thursday, September 2 for work related to the Zoo Parkway resurfacing and improvement project.

The eastbound and westbound lanes of Broward Road at Zoo Parkway will close in phases during the overnight work hours to facilitate construction. Broward Road will remain open and accessible with flaggers in place to direct drivers through the construction zone.

Sunday, August 29: The I-95 northbound on-ramp from Zoo Parkway will be closed from 7 p.m. to 6 a.m. the next morning. Traffic will detour south to Edgewood Avenue to access I-95 north. (Detour and closure shown in Map 1 below.)





Tuesday, August 31: The I-95 southbound off-ramp to Broward Road will be closed from 7 p.m. to 6 a.m. the next morning. Traffic will detour south to the Zoo Parkway interchange and travel east on Zoo Parkway to the U.S. 17 interchange to access westbound Broward Road. (Detour and closure shown in Map 3 below.)

The \$3.4 million Zoo Parkway at I-95 and U.S. 17 resurfacing and improvement project consists of milling and resurfacing, base work, drainage improvements, lighting, highway signage, sidewalks, guardrail, utility work and other incidental construction. It is scheduled for completion in spring 2022, weather and unforeseen circumstances permitting.
