I-95 Bridge over Nassau River Rehabilitation Project Begins February

Bridge Repair Work Requires Long Term Single Lane Closure

Nassau County, Fla. – The Florida Department of Transportation is scheduled to begin a repair and rehabilitation project on the I-95 bridges over the Nassau River in early February that will require extended lane closures during construction.

While much of the work will be performed underneath the bridge, extended single lane closures on both northbound and southbound lanes of the bridge are required in order to safely perform construction activities.

These lane closures are expected to be implemented in early February 2022 and will remain in place during construction. Virtual message boards have been installed this week to alert drivers of the upcoming lane closure.

Superior Construction was hired to complete the \$11.79 million repair and rehabilitation work on Bridge No. 720218 and Bridge No. 720336 by late 2023, weather and schedule permitting.
