Multiple Lane Closures, Detour Planned Overnight at Butler Boulevard and San Pablo Road Interchange Tonight through Friday, Feb. 11

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. – Overnight closures at the Butler Boulevard (State Road 202) and San Pablo Road interchange are planned Wednesday, Feb. 9 through Friday, Feb. 11 for milling and paving activities, weather and unforeseen circumstances permitting.

Starting at 8 p.m. each night, southbound San Pablo Road will be reduced to one lane. At 9:30 p.m., all lanes of southbound San Pablo Road will be detoured to westbound Butler Boulevard, where drivers can take Hodges Boulevard or Kernan Boulevard to access eastbound Butler Boulevard to San Pablo Road.

Starting at 8 p.m. nightly, drivers on northbound San Pablo Road wishing to access westbound Butler Boulevard will be detoured to Mayo Clinic, where they can make a U-turn to take southbound San Pablo Road to the ramp to westbound Butler Boulevard.

All lanes of both northbound and southbound San Pablo Road will reopen by 6 a.m. the following morning.
