Repairs to the I-95 South Bridge Over Hendricks Avenue to Begin Next Week

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. - Repairs on the I-95 south collector/distributor bridge over Hendricks Avenue are scheduled to begin Sunday, March 19 and continue until late April 2022, weather and unforeseen circumstances permitting.

FDOT determined repairs are necessary after inspecting damage sustained when an over-height vehicle struck the bridge earlier this month. Repairs will consist of removing and replacing two support beams, making minor repairs to three support beams and replacing a portion of the bridge deck.

Traffic will be maintained in accordance with FDOT standards. Drivers on the I-95 south collector/distributor can expect continuous, multiple-lane closures throughout the duration of the repairs. Periodic, overnight detours of the Acosta Bridge, the Main Street Bridge and Hendricks Avenue will also be required. Dates, times and details of the detours will be announced as they are scheduled. Drivers in the area may see congestion during peak hours.

March is bicycle safety month. When cycling always wear a helmet and ride in the same direction of traffic on the street. Obey all traffic signs, signals, and markings.
