Traffic Advisory: Lane Closures and Detours Planned March 22-26 for Railroad Crossing Improvements

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. – Drivers should expect lane closures, flagging operations and detours in Duval County as part of the Statewide Traffic and Railroad Initiative Using Dynamic Envelopes initiative, officially known as "Operation STRIDE."

Through <u>Operation STRIDE</u>, the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) is implementing rail crossing safety measures on state roadways with the goal of eliminating crashes at state road rail crossings. The work includes installation of Rail Dynamic Envelopes (conspicuous pavement markings), enhanced signage and rail safety education.

Construction will take place at the following locations from Monday, March 22 to Friday, March 26, weather permitting:

- U.S. 17 (State Road 5) north of Eastport Road lane closures 8 a.m. 6 p.m.
- U.S. 17 (State Road 5) south of Lawton Avenue lane closures 8 a.m. 6 p.m.
- U.S. 90 (State Road 10) west of Ellis Road traffic will be detoured via Lane Avenue, I-10, and Cassat Avenue 7 p.m. to 6 a.m.

Once construction is completed at one crossing, crews will move to the next crossing and begin work. The lane closures will be removed early if work is completed ahead of schedule or could be in place longer due to weather or unforeseen circumstances.
